

## *Discussion Prompt Checklist:*

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- Encourages creative/reflective thinking (i.e. possible answers are sufficiently open-ended)
  - If only rote recall, how can the prompt be reshaped to force students to apply facts, figures, etc. to make it higher-level?
  - Keep in mind, posts requiring paraphrasing or summarizing can provide a scaffold approach to future higher-level prompts.
- Encourages responses from students that will allow other students to provide feedback or elaboration (if an intended part of the activity)
- Suggests an approximate length
  - Try not to make it so concrete/specific that it stifles creativity; human nature tends to do the least amount that is required...
- Indicates how often they should comment on others' posts
  - e.g. "...initial post plus two replies to others' initial posts"
- Are they allowed to work with others to formulate a response?
  - If so, should they respond individually or as a group (one member posts the group response)?

## *Additional Discussion Tips:*

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Have students create responses relating their “text” to 1 of 3 sources:

**TT: Text to Text** - their text relates to another text source

**TS: Text to Self** - their text relates to their own lives/experiences

**TW: Text to World** - their text relates to their world, in general

Starting out, have students use the following acronym to guide posts:

**S: Statement** - State your response

**E: Example** - Give at least 1 example to support your response

**E: Explain** - Explain how the example(s) support(s) response

Use a general rubric that is easy for you to use to grade and easy for students to remember, such as:

# point(s) for Original Thought / Contribution	# point(s) for Development of Thought	# point(s) for Responding to Others' Posts
Perspective has not been previously posted	Full explanation, detail, insight; usually requires at least 1 paragraph to accomplish this	Responds with quality posts (based on criteria on left) of a certain amount of students
